

BYA Chair Report

The increase in mental illness and distress due to the COVID-19 pandemic has been well documented. Increased rates of interpersonal violence, alcohol and other drug use, financial stress and uncertainty about the future have all impacted directly on our young people. Whilst we, in South West WA, have been relatively protected from the direct impacts of COVID-19, those of us working in mental health have been shocked by the escalating need. Across health, education and community services, the number of young people and families needing support is beyond our current capacity. We have seen unprecedented levels of stress, anxiety, depression, nonsuicidal self injury, suicide risk and school avoidance in our young people.

Blackwood Youth Action has responded vigorously to the escalating need with an increase in support to the youth of our communities. BYA has provided more social groups for young people who are struggling to engage in school; BYA is liaising with the education department to support those young people in interestled learning and a return to mainstream education; BYA has commenced case management to ensure those young people who are struggling with family, financial or social needs have these addressed; BYA has lobbied the State government rigorously for funding to support a multi-tiered mental health intervention through The Pyramid Project; BYA continues to advocate for the provision of support and services to young people at-risk.

BYA's responsiveness is made possible through the support of our community. The Rotary Club of Bridgetown, through the Tour of the Blackwood cycle ride, continues to fund vital psychological services across the Warren Blackwood. In addition, this year the Club has provide funding towards case management for at-risk youth. Talison Lithium continues to support BYA in many ways. A Perth accounting firm, Stirling Partners, is assisting with our accounting processes. Our volunteers continue to provide countless hours of service across many aspects of the organisation – from the Youth Advisory Group (YAG), to the YEOp Shop, youth outreach and mentoring, administrative services, grant writing support and the youth space redevelopment project. I must acknowledge the generosity of our community who donate to and support the YEOp Shop. This enterprise ensures BYA's independence and sustainability. The generosity of our community never ceases to amaze me.

From our Chair Cont

BYA was thrilled to be successful in two grant applications to Lotterywest this year. The first was to strengthen our organisation's governance and build our capacity for further growth. The second was to redevelop the youth space in central Bridgetown. We have also been given a grant to establish a young driver support program through Jane Kelsbie, Member for Warren Blackwood. We are immensely appreciative of the State government's support and hope to build further on this relationship. Dr Ross Field, BYA's newly appointed Government Relations Liaison Person, has been providing invaluable assistance in strengthening BYA's connection to government. It is encouraging that the Commonwealth Government has committed additional funds to mental health services, and we hope that the upcoming State budget will see an increase in funding to support our young people.

The Committee was saddened to lose Sergeant Phil Nation when he was transferred to Busselton earlier this year, but I look forward to working with the new Officer in Charge, Dave White. I am sorry to farewell Tania Evans from her position as Treasurer. Tania has done a remarkable job in calmly managing our increasingly complex finances as BYA has grown over the past few years. My personal thanks and acknowledgement to the whole BYA Committee. The group's rigor, honesty and integrity are powerful qualities that I am so grateful for. BYA is in very good hands.

There has arguably never been a greater need for groups like Blackwood Youth Action. BYA provides a space for dialogue, collaboration and strategic planning between agencies, government at all levels, and the wider community. We provide essential services and support to at-risk and marginalised young people. And we bear witness to the needs of our young people, and advocate on their behalf. Despite the challenges of meeting the increasing needs of our youth, we have many examples of hope...and many opportunities in which we can collectively make a difference. Let's continue to make small and significant steps towards supporting our young people to 'be the best they can be'.



Sessions completed with young people by BYA Psychologist and Case Manager *




Meaningful connections with young people through activities, programs, outreach.

Youth Services Coordinator Report

It is my absolute pleasure and privilege to report on the most incredible year. Whilst 20/21 has seen so many young people struggle in the midst of extraordinary challenges, I am so proud to have been part of a team that continued to grow and adapt to ensure our services supported our most vulnerable young people to be the best they could be.

Blackwood Youth Action made just shy of 3000 connections with young people aged between 12 and 25 in the towns of Manjimup, Pemberton, Northcliffe, Nannup, Bridgetown, Greenbushes, Boyup Brook and Balingup. These connections were made up of events, activities, mental health services, programs, and support groups, outreach, after school programs, education, training, employment, volunteering support, pathway creation and Youth Advisory Group (YAG) meetings.

Highlights for the year include having our Youth Advisory Group nominated and become finalists in the Tidy Towns Young Legends Award. Our YAG travelled to Perth, attended the awards with other fabulous finalists and were inspired to continue the work they do in our regions – representing young people and their wants and needs.





The Rotary Club of Bridgetown through the Rotary Tour of the Blackwood has provided funds for BYA to deliver a case management service. This service works with young people to engage with community, connect to required recreational and psychological services, support in creating future employment and training pathways, and counselling. Since it's inception in April 2021 the program has delivered 94 sessions.

To support the outcomes of our case management program, and provide interest led learning for young people, BYA has accessed the incredible resource that is our Youth Enterprise Opportunity Shop (YEOp Shop). Young people are supported and encouraged to establish and refine skills in finance, retail, customer service, marketing and promotion, event management, merchandising, as well as interior design, fashion, and social media marketing. Outcomes include work placement, increased mental health and wellbeing, increased confidence, communication skills, local mentoring connections ensuring lasting supportive relationships, and a very funky and vibrant shop. BYA is incredibly grateful to the army of volunteers, past and present, for creating and growing such a safe, inclusive, encouraging space.

Youth Services Coordinator Report cont

BYA, in collaboration with The Education Department of WA via local high schools, delivered an extremely successful mental health expo targeting 270 year 9 students from all the high schools in the Warren Blackwood. YARN about Mental Health explored issues relating to mental health and wellbeing, how to identify them in self and others and who to access for assistance. Talented local artist, Tracey Barnett shared her mental health journey through her music and by sharing her story. It was exceptionally powerful and relatable to many, given she grew up in the area. Youth Focus Hawaiian Ride for Youth participants stopped in, with one of their riders sharing their experience of mental health distress. Many local mental health services, and those in surrounding areas attended to supply students with information and support with what is an overwhelming need in our community.

Our team continues to grow. I am excited and honoured to work with such an inspiring, dedicated and seemingly tireless group of people to address the needs of our at-risk and marginalised young people.

I am so proud to have been part of a team that continued to grow and adapt to ensure our services supported our most vulnerable young people to be the best they could be.

I'd like to make a special mention of our incredible team member, Emily Smith, who facilitates our Dungeons and Dragons support programs, twice a week, as well as our Art Club on Monday afternoons. She created, organised, and delivered the epic Blackwood D&D Winterfest event, engaging more than 200 participants from as far as Albany and Perth over an entire weekend. Emily goes above and beyond contribute positively to the lives everyone she meets. She provides a safe, welcoming environment for young people and ensures they feel a sense of belonging through every connection. Emily has been an integral part of the Blackwood Youth Action team for over 5 years. It is my hope that she continues to impact the lives of young people with BYA for many, many more years.

BYA has some exciting projects coming to fruition in the near future. We've successfully applied for Lotterywest funding to upgrade the old Officer in Charge house into a Youth Space with a gym, learning space, maker space, gaming room, and counselling spaces. Funding for a Driver Support Program was awarded by the State government to assist young people to obtain their licence. We'll increase our team with trainees and volunteers to continue to deliver accessible and relevant services to assist young people to be the best they can be.

YEOp Shop Report



2020/2021 has been a time of change at the YEOp Shop. After 5 years of hard work and dedication as the YEOp Manager, Rosey Logan decided to resign from her position. BYA would like to express our heartfelt thanks to Rosey for leaving the YEOp shop as an extremely viable and well-regarded premise where you can not only find a bargain but also encounter positive interactions with kind, youth focused volunteers. The YEOp shop continues to fund our Youth Co Ordinator Role which is imperative to BYA.

BYA would also like to extend gratitude and thanks to our long-term op shop volunteers that resigned alongside Rosey; Tracey Flemming, Jane Hesketh, Melvina Mitchell and Maureen Flemming.

Emma Jackson a long-term youth volunteer in the Op Shop also left this year due to her gaining full time employment in one of the local business. Congratulations Emma and thank you Rosey for supporting Emma in developing her confidence whilst volunteering in the Op Shop.

Thank you to Rossie Evans, Shirley Carey, Lyn Evans, Sheryl Edsall for your continued support as volunteers in the YEOp Shop, it is greatly appreciated.

We have been lucky enough to have some new volunteers join our team, a huge welcome to; Janine Pierre, Michelle Venditti, Cress Mitchell, Helen and John Brown, Shirley Webster, Jen Blake, Maddi Hollands, Emily Hutchinson and welcome back Dalini Lee.

With change come new ideas and goals for the future. The volunteers have been attending monthly catch ups to discuss the direction of the YEOp Shop and two key aspects have evolved.

Aiming to provide more opportunity for youth to volunteer and be mentored in the YEOp shop to build confidence and skills and to encourage the YEOp Shop to be run under a cooperative management style so all volunteers have equal responsibility and skills.

YEOp Shop Report Cont

Some of the changes that have occurred to support these goals are;

- A subcommittee consisting of Felicity Lukins, Lisa Burgess and Tracy Lansdell has been formed.
- Keypad and safe have been installed to allow volunteers rostered for the shift to open and close independently.
- Eftpos has been installed to allow flexibility of payment for customers.
- Opening hours have been extended, opening Sunday's and later Monday's and Thursdays to allow more time for youth to volunteer.
- Held a 4-day \$2 sale to move stock and create some space in the storage area for the youth space.
- Promotion of the YEOp Shop via frequent posts on Facebook
- Planning to increase shelving in the storage area to allow room for a chill out space for volunteers and youth.
- Trial a blanket pricing system to allow for faster turnover of stock.

Due to covid restrictions elsewhere the YEOp Shop has noticed an increase in tourists visiting the shop in search of a bargain or two.

On behalf of Tracy and Lisa, I would like to say thank you to the BYA committee for the ongoing support and guidance of the YEOp Shop. Everyone's efforts no matter how big or small to the YEOp Shop are greatly appreciated

It is exciting times for our YEOp Shop, building on the solid platform that has already been established in conjunction with an amazing team of passionate people striving to improve the wellbeing of marginalised youth in our community.

It has been an interesting year for LDAG Bridgetown. In January I took over as Chair from Sharon Wilkinson, Lisa Burgess became Secretary. Felicity Lukins has remained as Treasurer and we have welcomed new members, Jaye Herring and Tracy Lansdell.

Although we did not access funding through LDAG in 2020-2021 we will be pursuing Strive for funding in the next financial year to assist with events and programs.

One behalf of BYA, which LDAG Group is a sub committee of, we applied for to become an LDAT. (Local Drug Action Team) with partners being Henri's and Bridgetown Family and Community Centre. This was for \$30,000 in funding for events and programs. Unfortunately, we weren't successful but will be applying again in 2022.

In 2021-2022 we look forward to exploring ways to make LDAG more visible in the Bridgetown community and to take advantage of the resources available.

Financial Review

BYA's has had the 2020-2021 financials audited by Hampton Partners. The audit report is available on request.

The Balance Sheet is healthy to support BYA's vision and projects moving into the next financial year. There is however, a loss is shown in the P & L report. This was due to a delay in the receipt of committed funds prior to the end of the financial year.

A very successful Rotary Tour of the Blackwood in the 2020-2021 resulted in a generous commitment of \$25,000 to BYA and an additional \$30,000 has also been promised to cover the costs of a case manager for two days per week. The proceeds of both these donations will be receipted by the end of September.

BYA is actively pursuing state government for funding of BYA Mental Health's Pyramid Project which is a tiered program. The grants committee are consistently pursing grants and funding for numerous programs.
